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# From Minister Rev. Joanne Anquist



This past year has been a bit of a roller coaster! On the one hand, with COVID no longer a pandemic emergency, we were able to

open our building and our programming to more fully live our mission to be a community of faith where everyone has a place at the table. Our invitation to all has been renewed: "Welcome. Take Your Place. You Belong Here." At the same time, we mourned the loss of so many in our community this past year. There were weeks when we didn't want to open our emails for fear that we'd find another notice of passing. Memories of what was and what used to be flooded in. I'm reminded that renewal rarely happens without some kind of grief. That's why it's so hard.

But as you look through the pages of this Annual Report, you will see how God is at work in our Community of Faith. Our worship services with Ogden United have benefited from the gifts of three ministers. The music program is growing in strength and provides grounding for our services. We continue to seek understanding of scripture and theology in a contemporary way as we all try to muddle through with compassion.

Outside of Sunday, you'll see the many opportunities folks have to deepen their faith, through book studies and Bible studies. Our Open Table program (formerly Messy Church) reaches people in our community that might not want a Sunday experience. How welcome it is to have a place to open yourself to the Spirit among us. Of course, our fellowship groups continue to provide opportunities to get to know each other. Pancake breakfasts and suppers, Christmas lunches and dinners, monthly card games, sandwich making, and so much more give folks an opportunity to get together to deepen relationships and connections.

Pastoral Care is the backbone of any Community of Faith and McDougall is a community that really cares. I always say the grapevine is very strong in this church! But new software tools and the addition of Rev. Bill to our pastoral care team has strengthened our ability to carry each other through all the struggles of life.

Our community outreach is thriving with intergenerational conversation groups, Opera Buddies as well as Taste and Try. These programs are a soft opening to the life of our church and encourage folks to take a place and belong.

Our Social Justice initiatives are making a difference as we continue to build right relations with Indigenous peoples (check out that reconciliation mural at our entrance!) and support refugee families as they adjust to Canadian society. Other projects like the Feed the Hungry Dinner and the Acadia Pantry continue to alleviate poverty in our city.

And on top of all that, we created new model of ministry as we piloted a shared ministry team initiative with Red Deer Lake United and Ogden United in the fall, which will be fully implemented in 2024. Hopefully, this will build on our strengths and lead us into the future with strength.

So much good stuff is happening here. And yet we struggle each year with budget challenges, and this year is no exception. In fact, it is hard to see a way to continue ALL the good work that McDougall does. Tough decisions are on the



horizon. I encourage you to consider what you value in this community as you read through these pages. Some things may have to die in order for our community of faith to live. That is the hard reality. But as I consider these things, I'm reminded of a passage in Second Isaiah. It is written after the Babylonian exile as the people are trying to figure out how to move forward. "Remember not the former things, nor consider the things of old. Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." We don't know the future, but we remain faithful to the call of Jesus Christ to set a table where everyone has a place and our assurance to all: "You Belong Here."

# Report from McDougall's Board of Trustees

Current members of the Trustees are Valerie MacLeod, Daren Patterson, Jim Fitzowich, Jim Porter, and Barrie Clayton. Meetings were held March 19, October 25, and December 20, 2023.

In fulfilling our responsibility for long-term building maintenance, we reviewed the Baseline Property Condition Assessment Report and identified some regular maintenance items, long-term projects, and discussed priorities. Urgent repairs to part of the flat roof areas were completed, and hot water heaters replaced. Trustees are in regular contact with the McDougall United Church Foundation, which has been providing funds for the larger building maintenance expenses. In 2023, \$96,000 was transferred into the Church account for this purpose.


The City of Calgary assessment is now \$1,660,000 (tax exempt). The church property continues to be insured under the United Church of Canada UCC Protect Plan with an insured value of \$10,249,989, which includes building loss risks, general liability, and UCC directors and officer's liability insurance coverage.

Insurance premium costs for all churches have been increasing rapidly over the last 4 years. As a result, in 2022, the UCC decided to convert the UCC Protect Plan to a captive insurance model involving a partial self-insurance plan. This new approach has given the Trustees some concern, and there are some administration deficiencies, but we have decided to stay with the UCC Protect Plan for now. The premiums have been reduced by about 15% under the new plan.

Negotiations with Telus for possible installation of a cell phone tower on church property are in process.

I wish to thank Trustees for their service on this fundamental church board.

# **Reports from McDougall Ministry Teams**

## Family and Community Ministry Team

#### Youth Group / LINKages Intergenerational Program

A weekly Friday evening youth group (5:30 - 9 pm), ran from January through June in 2023. Youth Leader Nik Sloat did wonderful work with the five kids who regularly attended. They would often cook together, spend time reflecting on a timely topic and then play games or do other activities. They also supported other ministries: e.g., cleaning and dishwashing for adult spiritual development programs run by the church. Also, they did several activities outside of the church together, such as going to an amusement "panic room" and to the UCC Kids Trek event in Drumheller, where they were the largest contingent from any UCC church in Alberta. While my limited time did not allow us to restart the Friday night youth group this past

Alberta. While my limited time did not allow us to restart the Friday night youth group this past **cDougall** 2023 Annual Report Page | 8 fall, I have been in touch with the youth, and am working on ways to continue to engage them at the church.

Our Friday afternoon intergenerational LINKages groups run from September to June. In 2023, the January to June program had 27 high school students and 11 seniors. The new group this fall has 31 high school students and 8 seniors. Last year the team consisted of myself, Nik Sloat as youth leader, 2 staff members from the high school, and 4 high school student leaders. This year's group has the same number of teachers and student leaders. Besides myself as the program leader from McDougall, we also have Sylvia Steventon, who volunteers to set up tea, juice, and hot chocolate. Students help with clean-up and dishwashing.

The LINKages Intergenerational Program this fall has been even more successful because many of last years' students returned as 12th graders. I believe this sustained interaction has helped me to truly build authentic connections with many of the students. Recently, several youths have begun to approach me with questions about the church and have taken part in other church activities. Several have come to me with genuine pastoral concerns, and one youth even asked me for a Bible. This bond building has also been happening with the senior participants, and I have witnessed organic bonds developing between the different age groups. This genuine concern for each other is filling the need for deeper connection with others. Statistics show such relationships help

combat the loneliness epidemic faced by people in these two demographics more than any other, particularly post Covid.

While, sadly, the LINKages nonprofit group permanently closed at the end of 2023, Lord Beaverbrook High School has committed to participating in the McDougall program through 2025. As our program was LINKages' most successful program, the LINKages GROUP awarded us a gift of \$4,995 to help sustain our program. I am confident that 2024 has great potential to foster more participation of these youth into other church activities, and, hopefully, even parlay them into a larger, more traditional church youth group.

#### Camp Kasota



Every year in June, McDougall United hosts a family camping weekend at Camp Kasota. The planning team for the 2023 camp included Rev. Danah Cox, Stephanie Hawes, Sarah

Lambert, and Sarah Reuangrith. A huge thank you to Stephanie and Sarah L whose participation at previous Kasota camps was a huge asset during planning!

The 2023 camp happened June 9 to 11. We had 13 families join us for a beautiful weekend of fun and relaxation.

There were many challenges this year with camp. When we reviewed the budget, it became clear that we had to raise the price for the first time in many years to account for rising food costs and inflation. In our closeout discussions from 2022 it was clear that getting enough volunteers to cook and clean up after meals might be difficult. The team looked at various options on how we might manage all these concerns before deciding to hire a kitchen team (Rev. Danah with Chantelle and Redman Everett). Our cooks were amazing and worked at a reduced rate as they understood what we were trying to do.

Because of price increases as we came out of COVID and our aging population, there was a real struggle to get enough families to run the camp. We had to stretch our net wide to recruit new people. Unfortunately, we still came up short. To save the camp we were able to incorporate a theme of "Diversity" into our talent show and craft to reallocate funds from a different budget line that had not been utilized. This meant we could run the camp with the smaller group that we had.



The group that attended was amazing and a good time was had by all. All the feedback was really inspiring and encourages us to continue this important ministry.

As we move into the planning for 2024, the budget for this event is at the forefront in our mind. Fish Creek United has agreed to partner with us so that we can hopefully increase the number of families that attend. We learned a

#### **Right Relations Report**

The Right Relations projects in 2023 were funded by the Chinook Winds Region and the United Church of Canada Foundation Healing Fund which "supports healing initiatives for survivors of the residential school system and its ongoing intergenerational impacts."

By offering safe and spiritual healing spaces, we welcomed participants to reconnect to knowledge systems, and experience learning and traditional teachings to gain perspective, comfort, and spiritual connection. The sessions in ribbon skirt, beading, and drum making offered participants the chance to listen, learn, connect, and discuss practices of wellness and healing with certified wellness instructors, traditional crafters, and each other. All sessions were free with meals, snacks, and beverages provided.

The National Truth and Reconciliation Day event was held in partnership with Fish Creek United. This inspiring event was attended by 110+ participants and included discussions around Indigenous history, the impacts of residential schools, and a participatory round dance signifying healing for all.

### Acadia Network & Action Group Report

The purpose of ANAG is for community groups located in Acadia to network with one another, to plan actions that meet a community need and to support one another.

In 2023, the group had representatives from Christ Moravian Church, McDougall United Church, Lutheran Church of Our Saviour, St. Vincent de Paul attached to St. Cecilia Parish, Cornerstone Chapel, the Acadia Community Garden & Arts Society, the Acadia School and Acadia School Parent Council, CUPS Acadia Place, Acadia Community Association, David Thompson School and David Thompson School Council, the Acadia Food Pantry, Ward 11 Staff, the City of Calgary Community Social Work Program and residents who are not affiliated to any group.

Highlights for 2023 included:

#### **Christmas Hampers Report**

The Christmas Hamper Program was a success again this year. With donations received, we were able to provide hampers with gifts, cookies, and a grocery voucher to 24 families mural installed at McDougall. The project offered opportunities for true engagement between members of our community of faith, Indigenous participants, and leaders.

2023 ended with the annual Stoney Nakoda Christmas Feast. Gifts and donations were gathered and distributed to Indigenous Elders and families.



#### Feed the Hungry Dinner

Thank you to all members of McDougall United Church who supported the 2023 Feed the Hungry dinner through volunteering, financial support, and prayer. We co-sponsored the Sunday, October 29 dinner at St. Mary's Parish Hall, providing 30 volunteers and a financial contribution of \$3000. At the dinner, 334 guests were served, with 196 guests dining in and 138 taking out their meals. As well, 387 hamper packages were handed out. Our financial contribution of \$3000 was raised through a combination of donations and from monies raised at our September luncheon/book sale. beginning the first Sunday after Remembrance Day. The hampers are delivered by the second week in December.

We hope to continue the program in 2024, drawing most of our referrals from the church community. Thank you to David Schlinker for taking on the role of Volunteer Driver Coordinator to ensure the hampers were delivered to the families. Once again, the generosity of this congregation with their donations, Angel Tree gifts and the volunteer hours needed to fill and deliver the hampers made this program a success. Thank you to all involved.

#### McDougall Scholarships Report



On June 25, 2023, eight \$1000 scholarships were presented to qualified applicants whose names

and church affiliation have been posted on the weekly Eblasts.

128 scholarships have been presented by McDougall Church since 1995. This year each scholarship was accompanied with a gift of a McDougall coffee mug.

The scholarship presentation followed a similar pattern with each candidate's acceptance speech outlining how they plan to use the funds along with their expression of gratitude. As they spoke, their photo connection to McDougall was posted on the screens. As of January 2024, \$9,600 remaining in the fund for future scholarships. In order to continue this program in future years, a request for donations to the Scholarship Fund will be made to Scholarship Program supporters at McDougall in 2024.

I submit this 2023 Annual Report with pride, and have forwarded the scholarship report to Martha and Dave Taylor, whose Family Endowment contribution allowed us to extend our scholarship outreach to the many candidates who applied over many years.

Although many of our youthful recipients may not attend church regularly, they expressed sincere thanks. I believe this process accomplishes the outreach goals that McDougall ascribes to.

#### McDougall/Christ Moravian Refugee Support Report

2023 was perhaps our busiest and most challenging year. In May, we were referred to two new Afghan families by the Centre for Newcomers. We have enjoyed getting to know the two single mothers who together have 4 small children. Neither parent spoke English, so we needed volunteer translators to communicate. Both parents are now working. We are fortunate to have group members with ESL experience to provide ESL weekly sessions. A significant current challenge is advocating for one of the parents who got scammed. The Royal Bank has told her she owes them \$4000.

Our original Afghan family is steadily progressing. The father has a full-time "survival" job transporting luggage at the airport. The mother can now communicate fairly well in English. Because the father was a translator for the Canadian army, he has been able to sponsor family members. This connection to the Canadian military in Afghanistan has been a tremendous advantage for our first Afghan family. The likelihood of our newer Afghan mothers being able to sponsor family members living in truly desperate situations in Afghanistan and Pakistan is remote. We console ourselves by helping those who are here.

We grieve with our two Palestinian families who have lost over 100 relatives in what is clearly a scenario of genocide by Israel.

One of our refugee claimant families from Angola was deported last April. The second family has been waiting for a decision since February 2020.

On the plus side: We celebrated with two of our original refugee families who became Canadian citizens this year. We rejoice in small triumphs



as families settle in Calgary and children advance in school. We held two picnics and an indoor games afternoon at McDougall. With the help of a badminton set and snacks, the teenage boys managed to survive the afternoon without video games. It was fun to get together without an agenda and for group members to see each other in person (we conduct our meetings on Zoom).

Our group has 12 members. In 2023 we welcomed two new members from Christ Moravian church and three other members retired.

Help from food banks is essential for these families given the increasing cost of living in Calgary. They were very appreciative of the Christmas hampers provided by McDougall's Christmas Hamper Program.

Thank you all for your support and encouragement throughout the year. We could not do this work without you.

Danah continuing his responsibilities for community care. The folks who really keep things going are the members of the Pastoral Care Ministry Team: Esther Petersen, Katie Mutlow, Sharon Hudspeth, Shirley Wilding, and Joan Johnston (Roll Clerk). Without their guidance and support, so much of this church's pastoral care ministry would fall far short.

There are so many initiatives that fall under the umbrella of Pastoral Care at McDougall, including coordinating and overseeing afterworship coffee, funeral support, Healing Touch, the Memorial Fund, the Memorial Garden, pastoral care phone-outs, McDougall's Prayer Circle, distribution of the remaining prayer shawls from the prayer shawl ministry, the Membership Roll and ongoing Roll Reporting, and the special services at scheduled at various senior's residences.

A special thanks goes out to Eleanor Anderson for her hard work sending out cards of appreciation and support, and to Shirley Wilding for her continued work on maintaining the phone-out data.

In 2023 the Pastoral Care Ministry Team began to offer support once again for funerals at McDougall by providing coffee, tea, and juice for after the service. This work has been faithfully tended by volunteers throughout the year, under the coordination of Joan Johnston.

The annual Seniors' Luncheon on Tuesday, April 25, 2023, was a great time for the 75 people attending. The student volunteers from



Foundations for the Future Charter Academy were a blessing. A big thank you to the McDougall volunteers who made it all possible.

On October 21, 2023, McDougall's Pastoral Care Team also hosted Rev. Dr. Geoffrey Simmins from the Chinook Winds Region for a Pastoral Care workshop called "The Art of Spiritual Care". Participants joined from all over Southern Alberta.

Our Longest Night service in December saw a larger-than-normal number of people in attendance, for what proved to be a meaningful and sacred time of acknowledging our weariness and grief, and naming those from our congregation who had passed in 2023.

This year, we transitioned into using a new pastoral care database program to enhance our efficiency and ability to respond to pastoral care concerns. It has been a steep learning curve for me to fully integrate into the life of McDougall, but I have certainly seen an improvement in our ability to connect with many more people over the phone and with pastoral visits, as we work to faithfully support this community.

As we look to 2024, it is my hope and prayer that you know you are loved, and you are not alone. We will continue to build on the progress we've made in this past year at extending that promise through our pastoral care ministries in the year to come.

## Worship and Spiritual Development Ministry Team

In Worship, we had several series which were presented over several weeks, including:

- During Lent we used a weekly series of scenes from a resource called "Going Deeper," about people trying to understand Jesus and sacrifice. - We commissioned a Lenten wreath (similar to Advent), and a candle was extinguished from the wreath each week by congregation members along with a short reading from a resource called "Lenten Candles." The wreath will be used in subsequent years.

- 3. We had a series on Acts over the summer a tough slog!
- 4. In September we started a series called "God Speaks Science," which integrated science and theology.
- 5. We used the resource "How Does a Weary World Rejoice" by Sanctified Art During Advent. Lots of thoughtprovoking art, poetry and liturgy that enriched our Advent.

Special Services this year included:

- 1. We held an Ash Wednesday service this year, as opposed to a service of ashes after the Shrove Tuesday event.
- 2. On Good Friday members of our congregations read monologues featuring people who were around Jesus at the time of crucifixion. Thanks

# Leadership Council

Within our current governance structure, the Leadership Council is responsible for decisions related to

- Vision, mission, and strategic goal setting and evaluation of progress.
- Policy development and organizational oversight, including delegation of responsibilities laid out in The United Church Manual.
- Annual budget and major deviations from budget.
- Reporting and responding to the Congregation.
- Relationship with Chinook Winds Regional Council and the UCC General Council.
- Official matters related to pastoral relations with paid accountable ministerial staff and the creation of new staff positions.

The Leadership Council membership includes: Co-Chairs, Treasurer, Secretary, Chair of the Board of Trustees, Chinook Winds Regional Representative, McDougall Foundation Chair, up to 10 members-at-large, Worship and Spiritual Development Ministry Team Lead, Family and Community Ministry Team Lead, Pastoral Care Ministry Team Lead, Outreach and Social Justice Ministry Team Lead, Ministry and Personnel Working Group Lead, Operations Working Group Lead, and Property Working Group Lead.

The 2023 Leadership Council held seven meetings which included four regular meetings and three extraordinary meetings, and one congregational town hall meeting. The council co-chairs, working group leads, and ministry leads provided reports to the congregation via Eblast and links on the McDougall website. Meeting highlights included:

- Welcoming of new leadership council members-at-large.
- Communication Working Group report and recommendations.
- Inception of a Marketing and Fundraising Working Group.
- Change of congregational reporting from every three months to every four months to better match the church calendar.
- After extensive discussion, the council voted in favor of The UCC Remit #1 – Establishing an Autonomous National Indigenous Organization within The United Church of Canada.
- Gave the Trustees the go-ahead to pursue a cell tower lease with Telus.
- Supported the shared ministry initiative between McDougall, Ogden, and Red Deer Lake United Churches.



- Initial discussions regarding the 2024 budget.
- CEBA loan repayment.

# Chinook Winds Region Representative

As McDougall United Church's representative to Chinook Winds Region (CWR), I attended the annual conference in Medicine Hat in May 2023. Joanne Anquist is Presider (chair) of CWR Council. In common with other mainline churches, the UCC is experiencing declining membership, ageing congregations, and many older facilities. Many Communities of Faith are preparing for a different kind of ministry in the future based on the current needs of their community and realistic expectations. The Region can help facilitate some of the change



and renewal needed. Collaboration between Communities of Faith is encouraged to help continue some community services in which the UCC has been involved in the past. However, some projects will need to be abandoned due to lack of funds and volunteer support. Through my involvement in the property working group of CWR, I have found a great need for better use of church capital resources to properly fund new ministry projects. These will be the key to survival of our church as a meaningful presence in south Alberta communities. It is my hope a more streamlined governance will allow this to happen.

### Communications Working Group

The Communication Work Group was retitled to Perceptive Communication & Response Work Group. Members of this working group included Nick Perrin (team lead), Ken Turnbull (contributing member), Sarah Reuangrith (McDougall Communication Coordinator) along with contributing support feedback members: Marylin Bates, Daren Paterson, Joanne Pritchard, Joan Johnson, Eleanor Anderson, and Marianne Medhurst. ### Marketing and Fundraising Group

At the Leadership Council meeting in October, the Marketing and Fundraising Group was formed. The purpose of this group is two-fold: 1) to increase the amount of money brought in through our current ongoing fundraisers and 2) to look at other fundraising or marketing opportunities that can bring money into the church.

This group is under the leadership of Sarah Reuangrith, who is in the process of building a team. In 2023 she worked with Valerie MacLeod (Mamma Mia Fundraiser), Frank Kurucz (in charge of the Fundscrip Program) and Shauna Kennedy and Rev. Danah Cox (Reconciliation Bookmark Fundraiser).

We might be a new group, but we were able to assist with two fundraisers so far: Mamma Mia and selling Reconciliation Mural Bookmarks.

Valerie MacLeod organized a Mamma Mia Sing-Along Event to raise money for the choral music leadership in November. The Family Ministry team partnered with Valerie to provide food for those who wanted to have dinner before the movie. This kind of event shows how multiple groups coming together in partnership allows us to create bigger events than we might be able to on our own.

Similarly, Right Relations and Family Ministry put on a successful and ongoing bookmark fundraiser where we sold bookmarks that showcased panels from the Reconciliation Mural. Extra bookmarks were made up that are available for purchase at the church office. We are hoping that we can sell more of the bookmarks throughout the year and during the upcoming Chinook Region conference that will be held at McDougall in the spring.

In 2024 we are hoping to have a fundraising team established that can work on some larger fundraisers.

# Ministry and Personnel Working Group

Ministry and Personnel is the only required committee/working group for United Church congregations. We are charged with ensuring that employees (both staff and contract employees) are compensated properly, that issues between members of the congregation and staff are dealt with, and that annual reviews are done. I work with Marilyn Bates with as-needed support from Joanne Pritchard and Margaret Holden Scott, when developing contracts and job descriptions, and with the Assistant Treasurer, Bruce Munro, who does the budget-related spreadsheets related to staff salaries and benefits. We very much need at least one more person to join the McDougall M&P team to start learning how things work.

Highlights from 2023 included: the retirement of our long-time custodian Harpal Chahal and the hiring of Jerimiah Laquette as our part-time Caretaker/Handyman; Retirement dinner / Staff Appreciation dinner in October; work on calculating the hours/payment required for the pilot Shared Ministry Project with Red Deer Lake United Church; then the ministry and personnel work required to move from the pilot into a longer agreement. M&P coordinated staff coverage over the summer for holidays/study leave and Rev. Cox's medical leave for his knee surgery. We also completed the required paperwork to change Rev. Joanne to .75FTE to allow her to spend time with her family during family illnesses and set up a secondment agreement with Ogden United Church for .25FTE of Rev. Bill's time to cover Joanne's Pastoral Care hours. We also supported the request for additional hours for the Office Administrator to be used specifically for grant writing.

As McDougall's M&P Lead, I have been appointed by Council to be part of the Joint Ministry and Personnel Committee that will be responsible for M&P tasks and ministerial support related to the 2 full-time and 2 parttime ministers in the Shared Ministry Project. We are committed to reviewing quarterly how things are working. Annual reviews for all staff will also be conducted early in the new year.

# **Operations Working Group**

The Operations Working Group (Operations) has been an integral part of the McDougall Leadership Council's governance structure since 2019. The Operations team met on Zoom on the third Thursday of each month in 2023 to handle the administrative business and budget oversight for the church. Council Co-chair Joanne Pritchard has been the Lead of Operations since its formation. Other members of this dedicated team this past year have included Rev. Joanne Anguist (Minister), Norma May (Treasurer), Peggy Jorgensen (M&P Lead) and Barrie Clayton (Property Co-lead). Bruce Munro (former Council Member-at-Large and now Council Assistant Treasurer/Budget) filled the Operations Member-at-Large position in 2023. The Operations Convenor role has been filled by Mari Croizier and Sonia Dodd as well as Council Members-at-Large when needed. Other

Council Leads and members of the McDougall staff attended portions the monthly Operations meetings as needed. The Record of Business (ROB) Notes from each Operations meeting were communicated to staff and Council members immediately following the Operations meetings.

"Quadri Mestre" (every 4 months) reports from both Operations and the Treasurers were provided to the Leadership Council and made available to members of the congregation through the McDougall website and Email Blasts. These reports are housed on the McDougall website for future reference. Some key items addressed at 2023 Operations meetings included:



- Oversight of monthly financial statements including the Restricted Funds.
- Quarterly review of McDougall's Annual Budget.
- Input to the 2023 draft budget that was presented at the January Leadership Council meeting and the AGM in February.
- Input to budget line name changes for the 2023 budget year to align with the approved changes to our governance structure.
- Review and update of rental rates for September 2023.
- Oversight of service contracts for our music leaders and the Family and Community Worker.
- Hiring of a new caretaker/handyperson.
- Approval of Rev. Joanne's request to temporarily reduce her working hours and the hiring of Rev. B. Weaver to temporarily take over 10 hours/week of pastoral care work.
- Lease renewal for the Jesus Baptist Church's rental of space in the church basement.

- Approval for additional admin hours specifically for preparing grant applications.
- Oversight related to the re-keying of the church's external doors.
- Request to the McDougall Foundation for the transfer of funds for major roof repairs and hot water system replacement.
- Supporting the Trustees' negotiations with Telus for a cell tower agreement.
- Development of an agreement with Red Deer Lake UC and Ogden UC for a Shared Ministry Team Pilot in the fall.
- Assistance with the envelope stuffing, labeling and distribution of the stewardship packages.

# Property Working Group

The major expansion and renovation of our building in 2006 afforded us with several years of minimal building maintenance costs, however maintenance needs are now increasing as the building ages. Since McDougall no longer has a Property Committee, oversight of property maintenance has been taken on by volunteers John Naylor and Barrie Clayton with on-call help from Rudy Rumpel, Doug Dyer, Brennan Berry, and Jonathon Prevost. Landscaping assistance from the Degenhardts, Medhursts, and others is much appreciated. Regular inspections by qualified persons are required for such things as alarm systems, HVAC, water, gas, fire protection, elevators, and kitchen facilities. Snow removal is contracted. Numerous tradespeople are contracted to make repairs as needed; however, arrangements for these takes considerable time. The main elevator required major repairs, upper Hospitality Hall lights were converted to LED due to continued breakdowns, and the outside doors and some interior doors were re-keyed. Larger, long-term maintenance projects are supervised by Trustees with funding supplied by the McDougall United Church Foundation. These projects cost \$96,000 in 2023 and included partial flat roof repairs and replacement of hot water heaters. A billing error by Enmax resulted in utilities being undercharged in 2022 and over-charged in 2023; this is now corrected.

Harpal Chahal continued as our main custodian until September when Jerimiah Laquette joined



staff as our part time Caretaker/Handyman. We welcome Jerimiah's talents and ability to make many repairs as well as efficient janitorial work. Harpal and Patrick Meenagh continue to fill-in on a casual basis as needed.

Early in 2022 we were fortunate to arrange the lease of a considerable portion of the lower level to Jesus Baptist Calgary Church, a new, primarily Korean congregation. Due to growth of their congregation, they requested more space this year, so some reallocation of space and renovation was required. The Holy Grounds room is being renovated to accommodate new McDougall programs, the Burning Bush room was renovated for extra meeting space, and Room 3 is now allocated to Acadia Pantry (at no cost), and room 14 for McDougall's Family Ministry program use. Danah Cox has a studio in one large basement room. Ogden United Church still has storage space in room 9.

- Can you think of any big or small collaborations that you might be able to do with other groups within McDougall or the surrounding community?


Vision for 2024 include:



# Monday Homeschool Group

Homeschooling requires a community and our Monday meet up group strives to meet this need among the homeschooling families in south Calgary. We provide a safe place to come and learn together. We meet on Mondays from 11 am -2 pm. Our usual schedule is to start with a movement activity (parent led), followed by lunch, show and tell (a huge highlight for the kids) and then an activity or experiment (parent led).
